FROM THE DIRECTOR

In 1939, Gone With The Wind, the Civil War epic, made its film premiere at Atlanta's Loews Grand Theatre. The city proclaimed a holiday and the film's stars paraded down the boulevards among screaming fans. In Europe, a war of another kind began when Hitler invaded Poland. World War II brought Germany to battle not only with other countries but also to battle with the "Jewish question".

The Last Night of Ballyhoo is, on one level, great fun. It is the comfortable, familiar family comedy. On a deeper level, Alfred Uhry introduces us to differences within the Jewish culture itself. Many German-Jews like the Freitags believed success was determined by how well they assimilated into American society. Christmas trees, Easter eggs, and country clubs became part of their identity. East European Jews like Joe Farkas honored Jewish traditions. This "other kind" caused the German-Jews who had worked so hard at assimilation to fear they would lose their place in American society at the fault of "the other kind". As Alfred Uhry states, "The boy from Brooklyn in my play is consciously a Jewish person. All these other people are just Southern people." Through the Brooklyn boy, the Southern Freitags rediscover themselves, and the rituals they lost and found again. The lighting of the Sabbath candles is a gift, a gift of finding who the Freitags are, finding who we are and finding what our own unique heritage means to each of us.

Antisemitism was real. The expression "the other kind" was real. Ballyhoo was real. The Standard Club really existed as a club exclusively for German-Jewish society. The Venetian Club pool was real. The house on Habersham Road was a real house, and Alfred Uhry really did have a bachelor uncle who lived there with two married sisters with children. Welcome to 1939 Atlanta. Welcome to Ballyhoo.

Lisa Lovelace (Director)




Jon Scott (Joe Farkas)







1939-THE YEAR IN REVIEW

German foreign minister under Hitler, Joachim von Ribbentrop, sends out a circular entitled "The Jewish Question, a Factor in Our Foreign Policy." In it he makes this statement: "...The spread of Jewish influence and its corruption of our political, economic, and cultural life has perhaps done more to undermine the German people's will to prevail than all the hostility shown us by the Allied powers..."

World War II begins on September 1 with the German invasion of Poland. Shortly after, the United States supplies the Allies with arms (despite a




proclamation of neutrality). As a result of war production, the U.S. economy begins to recover from the Great Depression.



Thanksgiving Day in the U.S. is changed from the last Thursday of November to the fourth Thursday of November in an effort to extend the Christmas shopping season and boost the economy.

The World's Fair opens in Queens, New York, with the theme, "Building the World of Tomorrow". Germany is absent.


