Follies. Red Mask audiences are sure to enjoy Bud even more in his portrayal of Max Pincus.

MARILYN CUNNINGHAM (Frances Goodwin)—Although a member for several years, Marilyn is putting her best foot forward to Red Mask audiences for the first time in the part of Frances Goodwin. Marilyn has worked on the makeup committees for Red Mask. She is employed by the Danville School system as a teacher of the visually handicapped.

BETTY HARTSHORN LINNE (Midge)—Betty who has been away from Danville for the past two years is returning to Red Mask in the part of a model. Betty first appeared in "The Man Who Came to Dinner," "Harvey," "Belvidere," "Dark Victory," "Two blind Mice," "Heaven Can Wait" and other productions. Betty has also served behind Red Mask productions as makeup chairman, usher, prompter and on membership committees. A housewife and mother Betty is most welcome back to the participation in Red Mask productions.

Before coming to Danville Alan has leading roles in Lynchburg, Virginia in "Light Up the Sky," "The Heiress," "The Merry Widow" and "Life with Father." Originally from Providence, R.I. Alan also appeared in "All My Sons," "Guest in the House," Rebecca" in both non-professional and professional groups in New England. Alan has also appeared locally in the Danville Junior Women's Club Follies. A Red Mask director, Alan is head of the Oster Advertising Agency.
