"Everyone should know nowadays the unimportance of the photographic in art: That truth, life or reality is an organic thing which the poetic imagination can represent or suggest, in essence, only through transformation, through changing into other forms than those which merely present in appearance. These remarks are not meant as a preface only to this particular play. They have to do with a conception of a new, plastic theater which must take the place of the exhausted theater of realistic conventions if the theater is to resume vitality as a part of our culture."

Thus does Tennessee Williams explain the format of "The Glass Menagerie," his "memory play." In many respects, it is the most unusual drama ever presented by Red Mask Players.

The story is of four people and how their lives impinge one upon another. It is told by Tom Wingfield, the son . . . and the audience sees through his eyes as he recreates a memory of his family. He sets the mood early with this observation:
